Signs and Symptoms of Influenza-like Illness (ILI) and Gastrointestinal (GI) Illness

ILI Case Definition	GI Illness Case Definition
Adult: Sudden onset of NEW cough or change in existing cough PLUS one of the following: fever, sore throat, joint pain, muscle aches, severe exhaustion (Note: Patients >65 yrs may not have fever). Pediatric: Sudden onset of any of the following: runny nose, cough, sneezing, +/-fever, GI symptoms may be present.	At least ONE of the following criteria must be met and not be attributed to another cause (i.e. Clostridium difficile, medications, laxatives, diet or prior medical condition etc): -2 or more episodes of diarrhea (i.e. loose or watery stools) in a 24 hour period, above what is normally expected for that individual or -2 or more episodes of vomiting in a 24 hour period or -1 or more episodes of vomiting AND diarrhea in a 24 hour period or -Positive stool culture of a known enteric pathogen AND at least one symptom compatible with a GI infection (i.e. nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain or tenderness) or -1 episode of bloody diarrhea

Is it an Outbreak?

ILI Outbreak Definition	GI Illness Outbreak Definition
2 or more cases of hospital acquired ILI within a 7 day period on the same unit (at least one is laboratory confirmed).	2 or more cases of hospital acquired GI illness within 48 hours on the same unit.

What to Do If You Suspect an Outbreak

- **Immediately notify the charge nurse** (who notifies the site/unit manager)
- Implement Initial Infection Prevention & Control (IPC) Measures
 - Strict Hand Hygiene is the most important measure in preventing spread of infections (follow the 4 Moments of Hand Hygiene)
 - Restriction of Symptomatic Patients (ILI: Contact and Droplet Precautions,
 GI: Contact Precautions)
- Refer to and follow ILI or GI Outbreak Management Algorithms
