Diabetes Eye Care Clinical Pathway

Background and Purpose

- **Collaboration** between the Neurosciences, Rehabilitation & Vision (NRV) Strategic Clinical Network (SCN)[™] and the Diabetes, Obesity & Nutrition (DON) SCN[™].
- **Diabetic retinopathy** is the **main cause of vision loss** in the working age population.
- Only 47% of Albertans with diabetes are seen on a regular basis by an ophthalmologist or an optometrist.
- Therefore 53% are not receiving an annual diabetes eye exam, due to numerous barriers.
- The Pathway is based on existing clinical practice guidelines and is being developed to:
 - Support the early detection and timely treatment of diabetic retinopathy.
 - o Reduce the occurrence of vision loss.

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Steering Committee

Purpose

Provides leadership, strategic direction and support for the development, implementation, and monitoring of the Pathway.

Membership

- o Includes optometrists, ophthalmologists, retinal specialists, primary care, medical students, vision loss rehabilitation, endocrinologists and patient advisors.
- Co-chaired by the Executive Director of the NRV SCN and a Retinal Specialist.

Collaboration

With the Strategy for Patient Oriented Research Patient Engagement Platform to **ensure appropriate screening and eye care is available to all Albertans**, including vulnerable populations (i.e. immigrants) who experience barriers to receiving the eye exam.



Progress

- The **Project Team** is
 - building an inventory of optometrists who offer mobile services to patients who have barriers in attending an appointment at an optometrist office.
 - o adding all optometrists and their services to the **Alberta Referral Directory**.
- Members of the Steering Committee participated in the development of the following tools and resources for patients
 - Diabetes retinopathy <u>patient care handout</u>.
 - Awareness video on the importance of regular diabetes eye screening. The video was
 produced in partnership with Health Unlimited Television (HUTV) and has been
 streaming in 100 AHS locations throughout the province.
 - Awareness <u>poster</u> that has been translated in 11 languages (French, Spanish, Arabic, Persian, Ahmaric, Hindi, Punjabi, Somali, Tagalog, Tigrinya and Urdu).
 - The DECCP website and DECCP Primary Care Resource Toolkit will be developed and available in the spring of 2021.
