2021-2022 Annual Impact Report | Pan-SCN

The SCNs, Provincial Programs and their Scientific Offices released their Annual Impact Report, titled "<u>Recovery, Renewal and Transformation</u>." The report highlights important collaborations and contributions, major achievements, and areas of impact over the past fiscal year.

Published: Effect of Clinical Decision Support on Prevention of Kidney Injury | Pan-SCN

A randomized clinical trial (September 2022) that investigated the <u>"Effect of Clinical Decision</u> <u>Support With Audit and Feedback on Prevention of Acute Kidney Injury in Patients Undergoing</u> <u>Coronary Angiography</u>" highlights an important Partnership for Research and Innovation in the Health System (PRIHS) collaboration between Alberta Innovates and AHS. In addition to the notable clinical outcomes observed in this trial, the study design is a model for effective development, implementation and evaluation of clinical decision support focused on meaningful clinical outcomes.

Provincial Addiction and Mental Health (PAMH) integration | <u>Provincial Addiction & Mental</u> <u>Health (PAMH)</u>

Poster Presentation: Exploring Older Adult Perspectives on Cancer Diagnosis| <u>Cancer</u> (<u>CSCN</u>)

Within the <u>Alberta Cancer Diagnosis Initiative</u>, engagement with older adults, their family members and providers and leaders involved in their care provided insight into values and opportunities to strengthen support. A poster presented at the <u>International Psychosocial</u> <u>Oncology Conference</u> supported dissemination of this work. Insights gained are contributing to design and prototyping of a streamlined provincial cancer diagnosis program.

Future of Cancer Impact (FOCI) in Alberta | Cancer (CSCN)

The Cancer SCN organized a group of Albertans, clinical experts, and other key strategic partners to guide the development of the FOCI report. The report is a comprehensive exploration of cancer in Alberta which includes current and projected data, clinical and technical interpretations, and identification of key areas of concern to inform future priorities for cancer research and care. DISER platform launch | Diabetes, Obesity & Nutrition (DON SCN)

The DON SCN recently launched the <u>Diabetes Infrastructure for Surveillance, Evaluation, and</u> <u>Research (DISER)</u> platform that integrates individual-level records from clinical and administrative healthcare databases on patients with diabetes. It includes demographics, vital statistics, migration into or out of the province, prescription drugs, lab results, medical visits, emergency department use, hospitalizations, and more. New protocol: Anti-obesity medication | Diabetes, Obesity & Nutrition (DON SCN)

Sponsored by the DON SCN, the <u>Anti-Obesity Medication Protocol</u> became effective in November 2022 and provides support and direction to healthcare professionals working within AHS' bariatric specialty care clinics. The protocol aims to support providers when guiding adult patients on the adjustment of self-administered anti-obesity medications in the patient's home setting.

New e-learning module: *Opioid crisis clinician* | <u>Emergency SCN (ESCN)</u>

Opioid use disorder is a chronic, recurring illness/condition that is a major public health crisis in Alberta. How can you help as a health care provider? The <u>AHS PACES Learning Pathway</u> has CME accredited, accessible, self-paced addiction and mental health professional development training resources. One specific resource is the Emergency SCN's <u>Buprenorphine-Naloxone</u> <u>Initiation in the Emergency Department</u> simulation.

Know Your Data (KYD) | Hospital Medicine Section - Medicine SCN (MSCN)

The "Know Your Data" Physician Audit & Feedback pilot project has concluded. Approximately half of all eligible hospitalists and general internal medicine (GIM) physicians attended feedback discussions in 2021-22 which generated service-level, data-informed improvement ideas on how to address the current challenges in the healthcare system. Integrating Prevention into Connect Care for Health (IPiC-Health): First Pan-SCN PRIHS project | Provincial Population and Public Health (PPPH)

A three-year study led by the PPPH, "Integrating Prevention into Connect Care for Health" (IPiC-Health) aims to demonstrate the effectiveness of providing screening, intervention, and referral tools within Connect Care to support patients in reducing the impact of using commercial tobacco, alcohol, and physical inactivity. Partners on this initiative include Provincial Addictions and Mental Health, along with SCNs – Bone & Joint Health, Medicine, Surgery, Cardiovascular Health and Stroke, Digestive Health, and Neurosciences, Rehabilitation & Vision. New guidelines: Driving after a seizure | <u>Neurosciences, Rehabilitation & Vision (NRV SCN)</u> Through support by the NRV SCN, <u>updated guidelines</u> for patients and providers around driving in Alberta following an adverse clinical event (possible first-time seizure) are now available.

Long COVID: Patient/provider support | Neurosciences, Rehabilitation & Vision (NRV SCN)

New paper: Participatory design | Primary Health Care Integration Network (PHCIN)

New Committee: Provincial Anesthesiology and Pain Medicine | Surgery (SSCN)

Safer airways in Alberta: Urgent Use Sugammadex Program | Surgery (SSCN)

Airway management is a high-risk procedure, where commonly referred to as intubation requiring a protected and reliable path for oxygenation. A new drug, Sugammadex sodium can reverse the neuromuscular paralysis induced by rocuronium during an urgent/emergent critical and difficult to manage airways event, allowing rapid return to spontaneous breathing. Implementation in OR, ED, ICU and PACU will be a phased approach at AHS and Covenant Sites over a two-year period.

Facilitated Access to Specialized Treatment (FAST) program available in all Zones | Surgery (SSCN)

As part of the Alberta Surgical Initiative (ASI), the Facilitated Access to Specialized Treatment (FAST) program has launched province wide. FAST is a central access and intake program where referring providers can send orthopedic surgery and urology referrals to be directed to the next-available surgeon with the shortest waitlist, a specific clinic/surgeon, or to out of zone services. Since August 2022, more than 25,000 orthopedics and urology FAST referrals have been received. Gynecology, vascular, thoracic and general surgery are next to join the FAST program later this spring.
