- Consultation with other departments as it pertains to activities at your site (e.g., housekeeping)

Discontinuing precautions

To determine if discontinuing precautions is appropriate:

- Refer to the Continuing Care IPC Resource Manual Diseases and Conditions Table
- Consult your site IPC Designate / AHS ICP for guidance
- Consult CDC during outbreaks

Once precautions are discontinued:

- Arrange for laundering of soiled clothing, sling and bedding as per site practices.
- Remove additional precaution signage after room isolation clean and resident's personal hygiene is complete (bath or shower).
- Monitor resident for changes in clinical status and consider reinitiating additional precautions if necessary (e.g., new or different rash, new or different cough).

All equipment used for resident care must be cleaned and disinfected after use. Stethoscopes require a routine deep clean (use the attached cleaning card as your reference tool).

Deep Clean for Stethoscopes

Perform a deep clean on a regular basis or when visibly soiled.

Remove the diaphragm from the rim and clean the parts in soapy water or wipe with a 70% alcohol swab or RTU Wipe. Earbuds can be removed from the ear tubes for thorough cleaning.

Dry all parts and surfaces thoroughly before reassembling the stethoscope. For more detailed information on cleaning refer to the manufacturer's instructions.
