





## 2018 Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD)/ Operational Stress Injury (OSI) GRANT RECIPIENTS

Over the past five years, several initiatives and partnerships related to the military have been launched at the University of Alberta. A new Heroes in Mind Advocacy and Research Consortium (HiMARC) has been established with one of its objectives being to inspire innovative, ethical and clinically relevant research that is consistent with priorities of the Canadian military, veterans, first responders and their families.
