Important spring update

Alberta Health recommends offering a biannual dose of COVID-19 vaccine to all eligible residents of congregate care facilities beginning April 28, 2025.

What you need to know about Cold Chain Excursion (CCE)

What is it? A CCE occurs when vaccine is exposed to light or temperatures outside the manufacturer's recommended temperature range.

Why is it important? A CCE can potentially reduce effectiveness of vaccine, leading to lower-than-expected protection from disease.

Administering potentially ineffective vaccine can cause loss of confidence in immunization programs.

How to report and manage a CCE: Refer to the <u>Cold Chain Algorithm</u> for the steps to report and manage a CCE. Depending on the situation, the affected vaccine might still be usable or need to be wasted.

Individuals may need to be re-immunized if an ineffective vaccine dose was administered.

Reminders

- All providers who receive vaccine from Alberta Health must report CCEs. Refer to "Cold Chain Excursions" in <u>Alberta Vaccine</u> Storage and Handling Policy for provincially funded vaccine for details on how to complete this report.
- Follow all vaccine storage and handling requirements. These requirements must be met to receive provincially funded vaccine.

Vaccine storage and handling tips

- Reviewing the <u>Vaccine Storage and Handling modules</u> is an annual requirement for all staff involved with your facility's immunization program.
- Know the Vaccine Storage and Handling processes specific to COVID-19 vaccines.
- Practice auditing your own facility.
- Check temperature monitoring devices and change batteries at least twice a year. Refer to the <u>Vaccine Refrigerator Maintenance</u> <u>Cleaning Log</u>.
