Speech-Language Development and Hearing Milestones

It's a good idea to monitor your baby's hearing. This checklist marks the ages that a child will usually reach different milestones and helps you to see if your child is developing as expected.

*Age	✓ Milestones	✓ What to watch for
1-3 months	 Is startled or awakened by loud noises Soothed, comforted by a familiar voice Smiles at you Makes pleasure sounds (coos and goos) 	Your baby: doesn't react to sound
3–6 months	 Turns head towards sounds Enjoys music and noise-making toys Makes lots of noises (babbles, coos, gurgles) Responds to your voice with interest and sounds 	Your baby: doesn't respond to your smiles and interactions
6–12 months	 Responds to own name Turns head towards sounds Babbles a lot; imitates sounds and actions Starts to recognize words and simple phrases 	Your baby: doesn't babble or try to talk has stopped babbling
12–18 months	 Follows simple instructions Says more words every month Favourite words become "no" and "mine" Points to familiar objects or body parts when asked Likes simple stories, picture books, songs and rhymes 	Your child: doesn't talk at all doesn't interact with others
18–24 months	 Begins to use 2-word sentences Repeatedly asks simple questions like "what's that?" Understands more words than can say Points to pictures when named 	Your child: doesn't talk or uses more gestures than words doesn't seem to understand simple directions
