Hand Hygiene Scenario

Are you an expert Hand Hygiene Reviewer? Keep your knowledge topped up with this scenario!

You observe a nurse in the hallway working on a WOW. The nurse drags the WOW into a patient room, then performs hand hygiene. They then take vitals from a patient. After attaching the bp cuff, the nurse moves to work at the WOW. Then the nurse moves back to the patient to remove the BP cuff. Finally, they return to the WOW and push it outside of the patient room with their hands. On their way out of the door, they perform hand hygiene.
