## Quick steps checklist

Little changes can have large effects. Did you know that in the time it takes for two sips of coffee – about 7 seconds – we can take a quick step toward improving the Alberta Newborn Screening Program (ANSP) like

- □ making sure the blood spot card (requisition) is handled carefully and the foldover cover, covers the filter paper area at all times until the time of collection – contaminants from gloved hands, alcohol, petroleum jelly, cleaning products or any other source can affect the accuracy of the screen results
- □ double checking you have all the necessary supplies ready before poking the heel
- □ making sure the heel poke happens at the birth facility before the infant goes home
- $\hfill\square$  checking off on the notice of birth that the newborn blood spot screen was done
- □ double checking the dates and times of birth and collection are filled out correctly so the infant doesn't need to have the blood spots collected again
- $\hfill\square$  making sure all fields are filled out on the blood spot card
- $\Box$  double checking the expiry date on the blood spot card in at least two places
- $\hfill\square$  making sure the blood spot cards are stored away from heat, light and water

By dedicating 7 seconds, each of us can contribute to enhancing the ANSP.

### Bigger steps checklist

If you have a few minutes to make a contribution try

- □ putting yourself in the position of a new parent how would you feel if your baby needed to be poked again because of something completely preventable?
- □ checking your supply of the *Why does my baby need to be screened*? parent information sheet and newborn blood spot cards (these resources can be ordered by going to www.ahs.ca/newbornscreening)
- □ talking to your supervisor or manager about how your registration area is working to register all infants born in Alberta within 24 hours
- □ talking to your supervisor or manager about how your facility is working to collect infants' blood spots between 24 and 72 hours
- $\hfill\square$  sending the ANSP photos or ideas of how you protect blood spot cards in your area
