Transfer of AHS positions to Provincial Health Agencies & Provincial Health Corporations

On July 16, Interim AHS President & CEO, Andre Tremblay, shared some important changes taking place. Approximately 20,000 positions have been identified to transfer from AHS to Acute Care Alberta (ACA), including to three provincial health corporations (PHCs) under the purview of ACA, and Assisted Living Alberta (ALA), effective Sept. 1, 2025. For a full list of what is transferring, please refer to the <u>workforce transfer fact sheets</u>.

Core Services in AHS Include:

- Emergency Services
 - 24/7 emergency departments for trauma, heart attacks, strokes, and other urgent conditions.
- Inpatient Care
 - Hospital stays for patients needing close monitoring, surgery recovery, treatment for serious illnesses, and rehabilitation.
- Outpatient Specialty Services
 - o Specialty visits
 - Minor procedures or treatments that don't require overnight stays
- Surgical Services
 - Operating rooms for elective and emergency surgeries
 - Post-operative care and recovery units
- Intensive Care Units (ICUs)
 - Specialized care for critically ill patients requiring constant monitoring and support
- Maternity and Newborn Care
 - Labour and delivery services
 - Neonatal intensive care for premature or ill newborns
- Pharmacy and Medication Administration
 - On-site pharmacies and administration of prescribed medications
- Diagnostic Services
 - Imaging provided in hospital (x-ray, CT scans, ultrasounds, etc.)

Staff can now access Microsoft 365 resources in Connect Care

Previously, staff would have received the following error message when accessing Microsoft files from Connect Care; "Your organization doesn't allow you to view, download or print attachments from this device or browser. For more information, contact your IT administrator."

As of July 16, this issue has been fixed, and staff can now download or print Microsoft files that are saved in OneDrive, SharePoint Online or Outlook directly from Connect Care.
