What Is Palliative Care?

Palliative care is a special kind of care for people facing a life threatening or terminal illness. It aims to relieve suffering and improve quality of living or dying.

Palliative care is about:

- Providing compassionate care, hope and encouragement
- Enriching quality of life
- Providing support and comfort to individuals and their caregivers
- Providing pain and symptom management
- Addressing physical, psychological, social, spiritual and practical issues
- Coping with loss and grief during illness and bereavement.

Who Can Access Palliative Care Services?

Individuals living with a life threatening illness who are in need of pain and symptom management, emotional and spiritual support. It is offered to anyone, who is prepared to accept care, with any life-limiting illness.

How Can a Referral Be Made?

The individual, a family member, health care worker or doctor can make a referral to the program.

Anyone in their home, Acute Care, Continuing Care or a Cancer Centre can ask their doctor or nurse about palliative care services.

Anyone interested in finding out more about the program can contact their nearest Home Care office.
