Provincial Palliative and End-of-Life Innovations Steering Committee

Happy New Year to all our partners who work together to ensure quality care for patient with life limiting illnesses, and for those close to them. Thank you to those of you who participate on the Provincial Palliative and End-of-Life Innovations Steering Committee (PPAL/EOL ISC), Working Groups and Communities of Practice. We hope you had a wonderful Holiday season filled with what matters most to you. 2024 was a busy year with many great accomplishments.



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- Provincial Palliative and End-of-Life-Care (PEOLC) Grand Rounds continue in collaboration with the Provincial PEOLC Operational Dyad group. Since 2022, eight Provincial Grand Round sessions have been held, with topics ranging from education on PEOLC assessment tools to conversations on PEOLC. - The final launch of Connect Care is now complete. The provincial PEOLC team continues to support the prioritization and implementation of optimization tickets for PEOLC and ACP/GCD workflows in Connect Care.
- There have been some significant publications this year including:
 - An article by CHPCA featuring an update about the evolution of PEOLC in Alberta. <u>Building Capacity</u>, <u>Bridging Gaps – The Evolution of Palliative and End-of-life Care in Alberta - CHPCA</u>
 - The Alberta edition of the Canadian Atlas of Palliative Care was created by the University of Calgary's Division of Palliative Medicine, Alberta Health Services, the Covenant Health Palliative Institute, and the Alberta Hospice Palliative Care Association, in collaboration with Pallium Canada and the Joshua Shadd Pallium Research Hub at McMaster University. <u>Alberta Palliative Care Atlas</u>
- Funded by Alberta Health, the Provincial PEOLC team and the Capacity management team are embarking on year 3 of leading the following two Continuing Care Transformation initiatives:
 - o To increase the number of new Palliative Home Care clients by 500 by March 2026.
 - o To increase hospice capacity by 25 beds by March 2026.

Education Opportunity for Health Care Aides: Palliative Care

As an HCA, you may be eligible for no-cost education on palliative care. The Pallium Canada Learning Essential Approaches to Palliative Care course for HCAs is funded by Alberta Health and will support learning on palliative and end-of-life care.

About the Course

This Pallium Canada Learning Essential Approaches to Palliative Care (LEAP) HCA course features the following:

- interactive, self-learning online modules completed at your own pace (approximately 8 10 hours of work),
- short quizzes at the end of each module to assess knowledge, and
- learners receive a LEAP certificate of completion.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Identify individuals who could benefit from a palliative care approach.
- Recognize the meaning of key terms related to Advance Care Planning.
- Identify pain types and causes of pain.
- Recognize the role that HCAs play in helping the care team select medication.
- Recognize the impact that delirium has on patients and families.
- Recognize the difference between individuals experiencing normal grief, and those at risk of more complicated grief.
- Identify the 'Dignity Conserving Care' approach to support individuals and maintain hopefulness.





Advance Care Planning/Goals of Care Designation (ACP/GCD)

Connect Care work of enhancing just-in-time ACP/GCD clinical guidance in Best Practice Advisories, Patient Storyboard and GCD order was completed and went live on October 16th 2024. This work also included new tip sheets and guidance around Green Sleeve reconciliation.

Provincial ACP/GCD has submitted several Connect Care optimizations tickets requests informed by recent ACP/GCD Human Factors recommendations.

MyCare Conversations links has been added to the ACP/GCD Health Professionals website under "Tools to use with Patients & Families".

Work continues to complete the remaining 6 tip-of-the-month one-pagers which focus on highlighting available resources for common ACP/GCD questions and issues that clinicians have.

Advance Care Planning Canada shared they have updated and re-branded their ACP resources and website to be more inclusive and accessible to those living with disabilities.

Provincial ACP/GCD was invited to present to the Seniors & Continuing Care Provincial Advisory Council about Advance Care Planning in Dec 2024.
