

Corner Brook, Newfoundland and Labrador


Corner Brook is located on the west coast of Newfoundland, at the mouth of the Humber River and on the shores of the Bay of Islands. There are many nearby mountains, and the town even has its own downhill ski resort, Marble Mountain.

The area used to be home to four different smaller communities, but they joined together in 1956 to form Corner Brook. It is now the largest town in western Newfoundland.

The biggest employer in Corner Brook is the Corner Brook Pulp & Paper Mill. The town is also home to a growing film and television industry, and has the largest sound stage in Atlantic Canada. A sound stage is a soundproof building used for filming.

Corner Brook hosted the 1999 Canada Winter Games. It is one of the smallest places to ever host this event!

Corner Brook is the birthplace of Michael Walker, the economist who founded the Fraser Institute in British Columbia.
