#### Key achievements of 2019-20

The David Thompson Health Advisory Council (DTHAC) has worked intentionally to contribute to building stronger relationships between the people in its communities and AHS. It has done so by having frank and open conversations about health service delivery with AHS at its meetings.

In the fall, Council members attended the annual Advisory Council Fall Forum to hear a variety of presentations including learning about the Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity & Expression Provincial Advisory Council (SOGIE PAC), HeartMath and Connect Care. We also got to participate in breakout sessions that focused on wellness. The Forum was a great opportunity to network with fellow Council members, Alberta Health Services staff and members of the AHS Board of Directors.

Some of our members have roles outside of the HAC that complement the work of our Council, including committee work with Primary Care Networks (PCN) and Rural Health Professions Action Plan (RhPAP). This helps connect our HAC with local community groups and creates more opportunity to discuss health needs more broadly.

Alberta Health Services (AHS) invited Council to attend special events:

- The grand opening of the Lacombe Hospital and Care Centre Emergency Department, following a major renovation.
- A tour of the Red Deer Regional Hospital with Tyler Shandro, Minister of Health.
- The opening of the new Protection of Children Abusing Drugs (PChAD) protective safe house in Red Deer. The facility expands access to detoxification and treatment options for youth to address substance use or concurrent disorders.

Council participated in the Shared Decision Making (SDM) focus group that was run by an AHS Improving Health Outcomes Together (IHOT) Team. The IHOT Team engaged front line health care providers, AHS Health Advisory Council members and AHS Patient and Family Advisors to better understand the current state, challenges, implementation opportunities of SDM and the role it plays in clinical appropriateness.

Throughout the year we shared Top Concerns from within our communities with the AHS Board. This helped contribute to a broad understanding of health service delivery issues across the province. Concerns shared include: access to addiction and mental health services and increasing opioid use, access to diagnostics services, navigation and integration of services, bed availability in seniors and continuing care, and wait times to see specialists and family physicians.

We held a Council meeting in Consort that was well attended by local community members. This resulted in the formation of a working group intended to address the need for mental health support for adults and children in the area.

Our Council was also invited to present to the Community Engagement Committee of the Board in May 2019 where we outlined our successes, challenges and opportunities.



#### A look ahead

The implementation of the new direction of Health Advisory Councils (HAC 2.0) is something we are excited about. As part of HAC 2.0, we will host a minimum of two community events that are co-designed with AHS. This will be of great help as we seek to build more awareness of the Council. As a result of increased awareness, we hope to see an increase in public attendance at our meetings so we can gather more public feedback and provide more meaningful contributions to the health system.

As part of its goal to provide input to AHS healthcare programs, services or emerging initiatives, Council will participate in the following:

- Steering and Logistics Committee for the move into the new Community Health Centre space in Lacombe. The centre will house several community programs such as mental health, public health, community rehabilitation programs and home care.
- AHS Review Implementation Coordinating Committee.

The David Thompson Health Advisory Council is looking for geographic representation from the communities of Wetaskiwin, Drumheller, Hanna and Olds. Representation from across the zone will ensure a broad understanding of the needs in our area and will create more opportunity for communities to connect. It has been a pleasure getting to know the members of the DTHAC over the last year. As a new Chief Zone Officer in the Central Zone, I have come to truly appreciate the wisdom and diversity the Health Advisory Council members bring to discussions about Health Care in the Zone. The members' deep commitment to their communities has enriched our understanding of local priorities and has helped us to build deeper, stronger and more collaborative relationships in the communities within the Zone.
