Key achievements of 2020-21

Despite its challenges, 2020-21 came with many great achievements for the DTHAC. Namely, a total of 198 community members attended our meetings and events, a substantial increase from prior years due primarily to increased access via virtual means.



We partnered with AHS to host two successful community engagements. In January we hosted a session on Virtual Health Services and in May a session on Homecare in Central Zone.



A notable presentation from Council's general meeting was Transform Your Stress: the Resilience Advantage. This session on strategies for managing stress in challenging times and supporting family caregivers was well-received and deemed practical for anyone to use.



Council was pleased to receive ongoing COVID-19 updates throughout the year, as well as participating in virtual COVID-19 Community Conversations for Central Zone, and to engage in dialogue about our experiences with COVID-19 testing sites. These sessions provided an opportunity to address questions and concerns and equipped us with resources to share within our communities.

Council provided input on a variety of initiatives, including:

- The Red Deer Regional Hospital Centre (RDRHC) project
- Government Order (CMOH Order 29-2020) mandating that Designated Support Living, Long Term Care, and Hospice services have a family presence and visitation process to ensure access to loved ones as safely as possible
- Participated in an Alberta Health Facility-based Continuing Care focus group
- Participated in facilitated dialogue on EMS Dispatch Consolidation between EMS leadership and HAC members who lived in impacted communities.

As part of our professional growth, we participated in an education session on Unconscious Bias. This informative session guided members through the basics of Unconscious Bias, how it manifests itself in our daily lives, and AHS' work towards diversity and inclusion in healthcare.

On April 26, Carole Tkach, parting Council Chair, Gerry Greschner newly elected Council Chair, and Peggy Makofka, Vice Chair attended a Council of Chairs meeting with the Honourable Tyler Shandro, Minister of Health. Minister Shandro provided health service updates and engaged in conversation with Chairs from across the province.

2020-21 has been an extraordinary year. As we all had to make adjustments to our lives through the pandemic, I would like to thank all my staff and the Health Advisory Council for their help promoting safety. It is through your support in AHS and commitment to ensuring the voice of your communities is heard that we can move through the pandemic. I look forward to more discussions about healthcare in the Zone and meeting soon, face-to-face.

A look ahead

As we plan for the year ahead Council will focus on connecting with the communities in our Zone as we plan for meetings and engagement events in 2021-22. Our meetings will continue to encourage community members to attend and share their insights on health service delivery from their communities. This will also be an opportunity to hear from health experts and local stakeholders on topics of interest.

In the year ahead, Council will co-host two community events in collaboration with AHS. Community stakeholders will be invited to participate in engagement and learn more about health initiatives across our Zone.

Plans for the coming year include:

- Focus on mental health and addiction resources connecting with various community leaders and organizations to learn their perspectives, understand gaps in service, promote programs, and share resources. We have a particular interest in connecting with schools, younger adults, and adolescence through a partnership with AHS' Addiction and Mental Health team
- Continued work with health partners, Rural Health Professions Action Plan (RhPAP), Primary Care Networks (PCN), and Family and Community Support Services (FCSS).
- Sharing of information about Seniors and Continuing Care programs and services, and learning of the needs of communities in our area
- Continuing to build relationships with other AHS Advisory Councils by sharing information through member involvement at Council meetings and events

Our Council membership is diverse and members are great representatives of their local communities. We hope to enhance that diversity through recruitment efforts to fill vacancies.



Advisory Council members share advice and feedback from their communities with AHS. Councils hold public meetings and engagement activities virtually or in locations throughout their geographic area that further contribute to improving healthcare services in Alberta.
