Key achievements of 2020-21

Lakeland Communities had a very busy year creating awareness for the Council, and it proved to be worthwhile as116 community members attended our meetings and events in 2020-21.



During the year we partnered with AHS to host two Community Conversations. In October, 45 community members attended a session where Dr. Richard Lewanczuk, Senior Medical Director, provided information on Health System Integration and the importance of connectedness in the community. He also spoke about wellness as it relates to overall healthcare. We received an update from Dr. Lenora LeMay who leads the Lac La Biche Community Connectors, a grassroots group combating loneliness in their community. This group was formed after an Enhancing Care in the Community information session held in Lac La Biche in 2019.



Our second Community Conversation in March had 50 community members participate and was centred around Social Media and Evaluating Online Information. AHS' Social Media Director shared real-life examples of misinformation shared on social media and how AHS addresses them. AHS Knowledge Resource Services also shared how to find trusted health sources online and how to evaluate online information. We were able to share links and resources with credible information with participants in our communities to help them make better informed decisions.



In March, Council members attended a virtual COVID-19 Community Conversation for the North Zone. Medical Officer of Health Dr. Kristin Klein provided an update on the status of COVID-19 in Alberta and the North Zone, and AHS' response – including its vaccination program. Dr. Klein addressed concerns and shared resources for members to share within their communities.



In April, Robert Deresh, Council Chair and Alyson Fox, Vice Chair, attended a Council of Chairs meeting with the Honourable Tyler Shandro, Minister of Health. Minister Shandro provided updates and engaged in dialogue with the Chairs.

In the year ahead, Council will focus on connecting with the communities in our Zone as we plan for meetings and engagement events in 2021-22. We will host two public meetings and we encourage the public to attend and share insights on healthcare services in their community. This will also be an opportunity to hear from health experts and local stakeholders on topics of interest.

Council will co-host two community events in collaboration with AHS. Community stakeholders will be invited to participate and learn more about health initiatives across our Zone.

The year ahead will also include:

- Increasing public attendance and participation at HAC meetings through connections made at community events, promotion, and invitations to local stakeholders.
- Supporting the AHS Addiction and Mental Health portfolio to promote its programs and services.
- Sharing information about seniors and continuing care programs and services.
- Continuing to build relationships with other AHS Advisory Councils by sharing information through member involvement at Council meetings and events.
- Member attendance at local community events to increase awareness of the HAC.
- Increasing Council connections with Indigenous communities in our area.
- Recruitment to fill vacancies on Council. Representation is needed from Athabasca, Boyle, Elk Point, Smoky Lake, and Thorhild. Click <u>here</u> to apply.

Our community health partners are essential and we will continue to build relationships through our meetings and events. Key stakeholders include Rural Health Professions Action Plan (RhPAP), Primary Care Networks (PCN) in the Zone and local hospital foundations/ auxiliaries. We appreciate the connection with municipal leaders, Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) and other local community groups.

Over the past year, Alberta's six North Zone Health Advisory Councils have been instrumental in helping us get critical COVID-19 information out to our communities and in informing our pandemic response. In addition, they have shifted to a virtual model and engaged hundreds of local Albertans through their community events. The HACs are deeply connected to their local areas and work closely with AHS North Zone leaders. We are grateful for their advice and collaboration. We look forward to continuing to partner with the True North, Wood Buffalo, Peace, Lesser Slave Lake, Lakeland Communities, and Tamarack Health Advisory Councils.
