

### KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

Since their inception in 2009, Advisory Council members have shared advice and feedback from their communities with AHS. They've held public meetings and engagement activities virtually or in locations throughout their geographic area that further contributed to improving healthcare services in Alberta.

Council continued building relationships through regular strategic planning meetings between the Chair, Vice Chair, AHS North Zone leadership and the Council Coordinator. These crucial touchpoints ensured consistent and open dialogue between AHS and Council, improving feedback to communities.

Council hosted a presentation at the fall public meeting on Community Outreach Specialist – Alberta Adolescent Recovery Centre (AARC). Those in attendance learned that the AARC provides long term treatment for youth and young adults aged 12-21 who are struggling with alcohol/substance misuse.

In February 2024, LSLHAC welcomed AHS Indigenous Wellness Core Advisor, Adam North Peigan to talk about the following work of the Indigenous Wellness Core, including:

- Implementation of the Indigenous support line.
- Implementation of an Indigenous Awareness and Sensitivity online course for all AHS staff.
- Policies and procedures on accommodating traditional spiritual ceremonies.

Lorraine Muskwa, LSLHAC Vice Chair and CEO of the Bigstone Health Commission (BHC) provided information on the services and resources it offers to the community.
