

Key achievements of 2021-22

The ORHAC focused their meetings and events this year on the health topics of interest outlined in the councils three year Commitments Plan. Building on the HAC's public awareness within the community, they hosted three meetings and one community engagement events successfully using virtual engagement tools

to interact with the public on health-related issues and concerns, providing them up to date information from the experts. With the addition of three new council members, Council continues to grow its reach into rural communities to ensure the entire zone and the perspectives of the community are well represented.

- Physician recruitment and retention
- Impacts of COVID-19 on the community
- Emergency Medical Services (EMS)

## A look ahead

The ORHAC continues to stay focused on raising awareness of who the Council is, while also remaining committed to raising awareness of health-related matters in the south zone.

The Council remains focused on educating community stakeholders and ensuring community questions related to immediate health related concerns are address by zone leadership.

Council is committed to five key areas and will continue to highlight these topics in upcoming meetings and planned engagement events:

- Seniors Health and Continuing Care: Council will partner with AHS' Seniors Health to host an engagement event and listen to the needs of the community and gather feedback, while raising awareness of the HAC.
- Addiction and Mental Health: In collaboration with partners, Council will learn more about the mental health needs of communities to share with AHS South Zone leadership.
- **Rural Health:** Council will partner with Rural Health Professions Action Plan (RhPAP), and Primary Care Networks (PCNs) to promote local resources. Council will also encourage discussion about available addiction and mental health resources offered in rural areas.
- **Indigenous Health:** Council will strive to ensure Indigenous voices are invited into the healthcare conversation at meetings and engagement events.
- **Virtual Health:** Council will engage the community to understand the benefits and challenges of making virtual health a permanent resource for patients.

Council will continue to value and grow partnerships in health. Partnerships with organizations like RhPAP, Primary Care Networks (PCN), and local health foundations are invaluable.

As our world adjusts to living through a pandemic, our HAC members continue to share the views and perceptions of the residents in the communities they represent. We greatly appreciate the perspective they bring, and their input assists us in addressing concerns, sharing information and shaping the priorities within the communities of the South Zone. The HACs continue to provide valuable input to AHS to support the delivery of healthcare services.
