Key achievements of 2019-20

Our Council members are well connected to a wide range of communities and networks from which we gather feedback on health care services. We share this feedback with AHS through our meetings and through the Council of Chairs.

We were pleased to participate in a number of events in the area with support of our Zone leadership. Members were recognized and included in the following events:

- We partnered with AHS to host a <u>Community Conversation</u> in Barrhead in December, where participants learned about Rural Health Professionals Action Plan (RhPAP) work and successes. The event was a good opportunity for networking and sharing health care successes and challenges, as well for consideration of new and existing community partnerships. Input from participants reiterated that access to services, system navigation and travel for appointments remain primary challenges in the area. Highlights of the event were captured by local media in the <u>Town and Country Today</u> newspaper.
- Three members attended workshops through RhPAP and Campus for Communities of the Future. Two members participated in the 'Mobilizing the Village' workshop and one member attended the 'Rural Community Building' workshop. These workshops help members build skills to work with stakeholder groups to address complex issues and facilitate the social innovation and transformation needed for their organizations and communities.

Throughout the year Council shared our Top Concerns with the AHS Board, for its broad understanding of issues across the province. These include: addiction and mental health (access for rural communities); access to services in rural communities; AHS communication – website navigation, timely responses to community requests for information; transportation from rural communities; and wait times for specialists and surgeries.

This year we recruited new members from Barrhead, Hinton, Sangudo and Westlock. We're excited to be hearing more from these communities and we're still looking for representation from Jasper and Whitecourt to help represent our large geographic region. A look ahead

Council has developed a robust work plan for 2020-21. Plans include promoting awareness of the Council, increasing visibility of Council at various events, partnering with AHS and learning more about AHS programs and services.

Council is looking forward to 2020-21. Implementation of the new direction of Health Advisory Councils (HAC 2.0) is expected to begin in the fall, where community events will be embedded into our annual planning cycle. Events will be co-designed with AHS and will be a partnership with Zone leadership. Work is underway to determine the nature of these events. We are also excited about the many large projects AHS has underway.

We have had great attendance at previous information sessions and we plan to build on that momentum in the coming year. We will partner with <u>Greg's Wings Projects</u> to share information about continuity of care and discuss ideas for improvements to the health system.

Additional plans for the coming year include:

- Partnering with AHS on topics of interest such as learning about the Cardiovascular Health and Stroke Strategic Clinical Network (SCN).
- Supporting AHS addiction and mental health to promote programs and services in the Council area.
- Sharing information about Seniors and Continuing Care programs and services.
- Inviting a presentation about Health Link services across the province, and sharing accurate information with our communities.
- Learning more about the Alberta Healthy Communities Initiative and how we can help promote it in our area.
- Inviting AHS Emergency Management to a meeting to learn more about disaster and emergency preparedness.

A few vacancies on Council remain so we will continue recruitment efforts until they are filled. We look forward to bringing additional diversity in age, gender and culture to better represent our region on Council.
