#### Key achievements of 2019-20

In the spring of 2019, the True North Council area was affected by wildfires. Communities continue to demonstrate resilience through recovery. Council members remain interested in health supports for their communities, especially those most vulnerable to adverse health outcomes. Council is particularly interested in Emergency Medical Services and Addiction and Mental Health supports. The following are examples of how the True North HAC has successfully partnered with AHS to meet Council goals and priorities:

- Partnered with AHS to host a <u>Community Conversation</u> in Paddle Prairie. The
  community, AHS and Council members came together to discuss the successes
  and unique challenges faced in and around Paddle Prairie. Access to and continuity
  of care for rural and remote residents was identified as a key priority in the region.
  Feedback was shared with AHS' Health Plan and Business Plan team.
- Dr. Verna Yiu, AHS President and CEO, attended the May 2019 Council meeting and provided an update on AHS activities. Dr. Yiu and Council members discussed the health issues and strengths of the communities in the True North area, including challenges related to health professional recruitment and retention. Council shared information about the "grow your own" initiative, intended to nurture school-aged students who want to pursue a career in health care in their local community.
- After wildfires spurred a state of emergency in the True North area, Council held a special June meeting to hear about recovery efforts. Council described the impact of the fires to True North communities, including the loss of homes and the mental health concerns resulting from these traumatic events. AHS shared community resources that listed sources of help and information on self-care.
- In September 2019, Council elected Liane Mercredi as Chair and Rick Cartier as Vice Chair. Liane is a member of the Beaver First Nation, with a background in Indigenous health promotion. Rick is a paramedic who has provided care across the True North area for over 18 years. Through his work, he has seen the medical, psychological and socio-economic needs of rural and remote communities. Liane and Rick are dedicated to bringing forward the broad range of voices in the True North Council area and reaching under-served populations.
- The True North HAC demonstrated adaptability through the COVID-19 pandemic by
  moving their meetings to a virtual format. Council continued to hold meetings using
  Zoom and invited past members to hear COVID-19 information and updates at their
  March 30 meeting. They also received a mental health pocket guide to distribute to
  their communities.

#### A look ahead

In March 2020, Council heard about a new direction for HACs. This includes increased community engagement and events designed in partnership between AHS and Council members. The True North HAC will hold a brainstorming session in June to develop ideas for community events and engagement initiatives that can be implemented in the fall. The 2020-21 Council year promises to be an active and exciting one as Council prepares to be involved in the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the AHS Review and co-hosting events. Some of our upcoming plans include:

- Co-hosting a virtual town hall in May for True North area residents, focusing on COVID-19, recovery efforts from the recent devastating flooding in Fort Vermillion and addressing concerns on the upcoming wildfire season.
- Partnering with <u>Rural Health Professionals Action Plan</u> (RhPAP) and AHS on health professional attraction, recruitment and retention. This includes participating in "grow your own" initiatives and encouraging young people in the True North region who show an interest in entering medical professions.
- Through the June brainstorming session, Council members will build a catalogue of ideas for future community events and initiatives.

The True North HAC will continue to work closely with AHS leadership and community partners to take on the exciting year ahead. True North HAC looks forward to forging new partnerships and making the vision for the future come to life.

The AHS North Zone team provides service to a large geographical area with a diverse population. We place a very high value on the information and advice we receive from a broad range of stakeholders in our communities. The HACs give us a regular forum to share ideas, receive input, and refine our ways of working so that our strategies and operational priorities are aligned with provincial and local priorities.
