

PLEASE POST OR DISTRIBUTE AS WIDELY AS APPROPRIATE

Key Message

• The use of ink (pen, marker, highlighter, etc) or non-approved adhesives on blood components (labels and bags) affects their integrity and renders them unsuitable for transfusion. Waste of blood products is occurring because of this practice.



Background

• Health Canada regulations state that labels attached to blood products be made only using adhesive and inks that will not permeate the container. When a product is returned to TM with ink or non-approved adhesives that are not applied by Canadian Blood Services (CBS) or the TM laboratory, they will be discarded.

Action Required

- Do not mark blood component labels or bags.
- Ensure that no adhesives come into contact with blood components.
