Re: Informed Consent for the Transfusion of Blood and Blood Products

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Situation:

- The recently implemented consent policy in Alberta Health Services requires that express
 written consent for the transfusion of blood and blood products be obtained for all
 patients who will receive non emergent blood or blood product therapy.
- Informed consent for transfusion of blood and blood products is an accreditation and regulatory requirement.
- The new policy <u>does not</u> outline specific details related to where consent will be documented, who will document consent or the means by which consent will be conveyed to the transfusion service.
- The Transfusion Medicine Network, in consultation with various health practitioners, is in the process of developing a standard procedure and documentation process for consent to transfusion in the province.

Background:

• In many areas of the province, consent policies for the transfusion of blood and blood products were already in place prior to development of the new AHS consent policy.

Assessment:

• Additional consideration and consultation pertaining to the documentation of informed consent for transfusion will be required prior to establishing a province wide procedure.

Recommendations:

- Use of the new consent form <u>or</u> pre-existing zone specific consent processes for documenting transfusion for specific procedures are acceptable until a province wide procedure can be developed.
- Obtaining consent is the duty of the "most responsible health practitioner" which in the case of transfusion is most often the attending physician.
